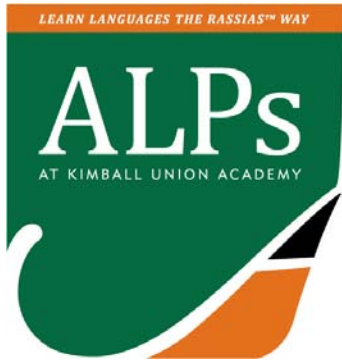


Participant Handbook Summer 2011



Honor Code

As members of a close and supportive community, the participants, teachers and staff of Kimball Union Summer Programs are guided by the principles of honesty, compassion, and mutual respect. Kimball Union's Honor Code reflects these core values and serves the additional goal of promoting personal commitment in all aspects of the Summer Program's life. The code states:

As a member of the Kimball Union Summer Programs community, I promise to uphold a code of honor, to expect and to encourage the same of others, and to do so in all situations and in all places. This code of honor includes being honest in all matters, behaving with integrity, and demonstrating respect for yourself and others.

The Participant-Parent Agreement that you signed upon enrollment verifies your acceptance of all Summer Programs policies including the Honor Code.

RESIDENTIAL LIFE

Governing Principles

Respect: An important aspect of community living involves the way participants treat each other and interact in the residence halls. The Summer Program places a great deal of importance on conduct that exemplifies responsibility and concern for others. Participants are expected to respect the rights and property of other participants, teachers and of the Summer Program.

Boarding life: Life in residence is an area of great opportunity, where lasting relationships can be founded, where personal growth can be nurtured, and where the habits and pleasures of enrichment pursuits can be shared. It also can be an area of great temptation, where participants make mistakes. It is important, therefore, to list the most

important residence rules. Participants should heed the following stipulations to make residential life as safe and as productive as possible.

Residential Living

Participants living in residential housing have a right to an environment conducive to personal safety and positive social growth. Residential Counselors play an important part in providing such an environment, but they cannot do it all. Each resident must take an active part to ensure the smooth operation of the residence.

Care of Rooms, Corridors, Lounges and Bathrooms

Inspections: Upon arrival, all participant rooms are inspected by the residential counselors and participants. Participants should use that inspection to note the condition of the room. Any damage or losses to the room incurred during the program will be the participant's responsibility. Some of the most common problems for which participants are charged include broken windows, decals on windows, tack holes in walls, paint chipped by use of scotch tape, broken door locks, missing or damaged furniture, and tape left on walls. Furniture removal must be approved by the Residence Head; abandoned furniture left in halls may be charged to the participant if damaged or missing. In addition, any unclaimed damages to the corridor or other common areas will be prorated among all the participants in that living area. Inspections will be conducted periodically throughout the program to determine compliance with safety and health requirements. Prohibited items will be removed during these inspections and either disposed of or returned at the end of the year. Rooms will also be inspected periodically for fire code and safety violations. Participants will be asked to immediately adjust their room to meet our standards and codes if violations are found.

Room Condition: In a closely-knit community such as ours, participants must be conscious of how the arrangement of their room affects the other residents, including counselors. Every participant must maintain his or her room in such a way that it presents an inviting, safe and productive living arrangement. Posters and wall decorations that display offensive subjects or glorify drug or alcohol use will not be permitted. Room furniture may not be arranged so that ingress and egress are in any way impeded.

Cleanliness: Although the Summer Program employs Facilities and Operations personnel, the primary responsibility for the cleanliness of the residential halls and individual rooms rests with the participants. Participants are responsible for cleanliness and order in their own rooms. The standard for this will be "neat and clean." Rooms are inspected regularly for cleanliness. To promote sustainability and environmentally friendly habits recycling bins are available in all residence halls. Participants are expected to sort materials and prepare bins for pick-up according to a predetermined schedule as part of the assigned rotation. Hall residents are asked not to leave personal belongings in common areas. Individual residence halls will employ additional rules to promote a positive community experience.

Residential Regulations and Procedures

Medication: All prescription medication use is regulated by the Summer Programs' Health Center and any participant taking or possessing prescription medication must report that fact to the Health Center. Health Center staff will make a note of prescription use in the participant's medical record and indicate which medications may be kept in the residence hall. Failure to report prescription drugs to the Health Center is grounds for disciplinary action. The inappropriate possession of non-prescription drugs of any kind is also prohibited.

Safety: Participant safety is one of the Summer Program's most important responsibilities. With the advice of various experts from state government and insurance companies, the following rules have been established to help make house life safe. Failure to comply with school safety procedures will result in disciplinary action.

- For **fire safety**, participants may not be in rooms with the doors locked.
- **Fire extinguishers, hoses, fire escapes, and alarm systems** are for use only in the event of fire.
- **The lighting of any flame or burning of candles, incense, or other combustibles** is strictly forbidden and, in almost all cases, will result in expulsion.
- **Smoking cigarettes** is a health and fire hazard and is not allowed.
- **Homemade wiring hookups or electrical repairs, tampering with electrical systems and overloaded outlets** are forbidden and will result in disciplinary action.
- **Voltage surge protectors**, especially for computers and peripherals, are highly recommended.
- **Televisions**, including external **monitors** or **projectors**, are not allowed in participant rooms.
- **Extension Cords** are not permitted under any circumstances.
- The possession or use of **electrical appliances** which contain heating elements such as hot plates or pots, heating coils, popcorn poppers, toasters, toaster ovens, coffee makers and irons are considered unsafe and is not allowed. Please note that illegal appliances will be confiscated and not returned.
- **Electric blankets** and **string lights** are not allowed. Heating pads may be used only at the instruction of the Health Center and must not remain on when not in use.
- **Halogen bulb lamps** of all types are prohibited and will be removed.
- **Tapestries** may not be draped from the ceiling or across a corner and may not be draped in front of or behind doors. They must be displayed flat against a wall. No more than two tapestries are to be displayed in a room.
- **Furniture** may not be arranged in any way which blocks swift exit from the room. Doorways must remain clear of obstruction. Pieces of furniture are not to be stacked one upon another and must rest solidly on the floor. Participants must be in full view from the door including sleeping quarters. Furniture is not to be removed from any room.

- **Refrigerators** are located in dormitory lounges and are not permitted in participant rooms.
- Participants are not allowed on the **roofs** of school buildings.
- Kimball Union prohibits playing sports, skateboarding or rollerblading in school buildings and residence halls and on public roads for the sake of safety. The Summer Programs Office can direct participants to approved locations for such activities.
- Existing overhead lights must not be tampered with in any way.
- **Smoke detectors** may not be tampered with in any way.

Fire Procedures: Fire escape procedures will be discussed at house and school meetings and fire drills will be conducted throughout the school year. The alarm for a fire or fire drill is the continuous sounding of the corridor fire horns. Participants should take the following actions upon hearing the alarm:

- Turn on the lights. Awaken your roommate. Close the windows. If the door is not hot, leave the room and close the door. Do not lock the door.
- Walk to the nearest exit. Stay quiet and calm. Arouse other participants if their doors are closed. Always keep in mind at least two different exits in case one is blocked by smoke or fire.
- Upon leaving the residential hall, go to the area designated by the Dorm Head. Attendance will be taken to ensure that everyone is present.

Fire drills will be conducted periodically per state law. Failure to evacuate a building during a fire alarm is considered a serious violation of school policy.

Miscellaneous Residential Procedures

Overnight Guests:

Hosting overnight guests is prohibited. On-campus guests during the day must be approved by the Director of Summer Programs and will only be granted with permission from parents. If allowed, guests are the host's responsibility and must conduct themselves entirely within the Summer Programs' code of conduct.

Co-ed Visitation:

Coed visitation between male and female participants is not allowed in dormitories. Violation of Co-ed visitation is a disciplinary matter.

Room Searches: Any administrator or Residence Head can authorize the examination of participant rooms when an incident, a pattern of behavior, or other reasonable evidence suggests the appropriateness of such an action. Such examinations will take place in the presence of one of the room's occupants and a counselor. The occupants will be held responsible for the results of the search regardless of the reason for which the search was initiated. In the event of participants sharing a room, the entire room may be searched.

Evening Schedule: Every participant must be in their dorm where a residential counselor on duty will check them in at 10 pm. If a program event runs past these times, participants are required to check in fifteen minutes after the end of the event. Participants who leave for the weekend must check in with the summer programs director or his/her designee by 7:30 p.m. on Sunday. Unauthorized departure from the dormitory after check-in is forbidden.

Valuables: It is strongly recommended that participants keep their rooms locked at all times when they are out. Participants should report broken locks to their Dorm Head immediately. The Summer Program is not responsible for stolen property.

Pets: Pets of any kind, including fish, are not allowed.

Electrical Appliances: Participants may wish to provide their own electrical items such as a desk lamp, clock, stereo, etc. Great care must be taken not to overload the outlets in the room.

Room Changes: Room changes must be initiated through the Residence Head but may not proceed without approval from the Director of Summer Programs.

Linens: Sheets, blanket, pillows and towels are provided.

Health Staff: Participants may have health questions which they do not want to discuss with teachers or administrators. Members of the health staff are more than willing to talk with participants in these situations.

Confidentiality: A participant who wishes to speak to counselors or teachers confidentially should be aware that any discussion which reveals a life-threatening situation or indicates a real danger to his own or other participants' health must be reported.

Athletic and Activity Offerings: Sign-up for activities occurs on the first full day of each session. Some offerings have a limited number of participants possible and participants may be asked to designate alternative choices. Likewise, some offerings may not be offered in the event that there is insufficient interest.

Facilities: Athletic facilities include eight playing fields, the Whittemore Athletic Center, the Silver Gymnasium, an outdoor track, and six tennis courts.

Religious Services

Participants who are interested in attending religious services will find that there are teachers available to transport them or arrangements can be made through the Summer Programs Director who can assist with such arrangements. There are two churches on either end of the campus and participants are welcome to attend their services.

POLICIES ON CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOR

Governing Principles

Our community is governed by our Honor Code and a set of rules we have collectively established. These rules should allow individual liberty within the limits of protecting the rights of others. Since Kimball Union's Summer Program is a community dedicated to enrichment, its policies on conduct have the additional goal of promoting personal growth.

The Kimball Union community takes these goals—the protection of rights and promotion of personal growth—seriously. The Summer Programs will not and cannot ignore behavior which jeopardizes them. Participants should also take those goals seriously. The quality of an individual's experience at the Summer Program is, in part, a reflection of his or her success in pursuing these goals.

Any participants who are not willing to live by the Summer Programs' policies should not join this community. Once in attendance, the participant is held responsible for any and all behavior that is contrary, in fact or in spirit, to the rules of the Summer Programs experience. The Summer Programs Director reserves the right to dismiss any participant whose presence is regarded as undesirable or whose influence is considered harmful or whose actions are considered to be behavior detrimental to the reputation or good name of the Summer Program.

Participants should also be aware that being present during the violation of a major program rule makes a participant as liable for the consequences as the actual offender(s).

Fundamental Values and Major School Rules:

The Honor Code and our major program rules reflect the guiding principles and core values of the Summer Program. We view as particularly serious any action which manifests a disregard for the personal rights or safety of other members of the community. Participants should be aware that violations of major school rules or the Honor Code may mean dismissal on a first offense and almost certainly will result in dismissal on a second offense.

The Honor Code:

As a member of the Summer Programs' community, I promise to uphold a code of honor, to expect and to encourage the same of others, and to do so in all situations and in all places. This code of honor includes being honest in all matters, behaving with integrity, and demonstrating respect for myself and others.

Honesty:

Honesty is a guiding principle of the Summer Programs experience. Participants are expected to be honest in all matters. A participant's honesty will be considered in making disciplinary decisions. Participants who have made mistakes are encouraged to admit them openly and to respond honorably or knowingly avoid truthful responses. Participants who fail to do so could have more significant consequences.

Respect:

As stated in our Honor Code, respect is an essential program value. All of our participants are expected to demonstrate respect for themselves, for others, and for the Summer Program. Participants are expected to treat all members of the community, whether they be other participants, teachers members, spouses, staff member, or any other employees of the Summer Program, with due respect and relate honestly and without deception.

1. Actions Detrimental to Learning: Actions which are detrimental to the maintenance of a productive environment will not be tolerated: repeated tardiness or absences from scheduled activities; being under the influence, using, possessing or being in the presence of alcohol or any chemical or paraphernalia for the use of chemicals, except such as may be duly prescribed by a physician and under the direct supervision of the Health Center. These types of actions demonstrate a lack of respect for the community and for the Summer Programs' experience.

2. Violating Rights of Others: Actions which violate the rights of others or of the Summer Program or which adversely reflect upon the reputation of the Summer Program will not be tolerated: theft, vandalism or destruction of personal property, possession or use of a master key or key to another's room, unauthorized presence in another dormitory or KUA building, gambling, fraudulent telephone calls, e-mails, or the unauthorized use of someone else's phone card, e-mail, or credit/debit cards; tampering with or gaining unauthorized access to another's computer programs, data files, or e-mail account.

3. Harassment: Hazing, bullying, or any other forms of intimidation of either an emotional or physical nature will not be tolerated. Behavior which infringes on another's rights, which victimizes an individual, or which compromises the integrity of the school is inappropriate and will be grounds for disciplinary action. By law, incidents of harassment will be reported to the authorities.

4. Sexual Harassment: Uninvited pressure for sexual activity, obscene or suggestive remarks or jokes, displays of explicit, offensive or demeaning material, and unwanted physical contact are examples of sexual harassment and grounds for disciplinary action. Such harassment extends to e-mails and other electronic communications as well. All sexual harassment should be reported to the Director of Summer Programs or a trusted staff member.

Participant grievance should be brought to a teacher, counselor, or an administrator. They will be handled confidentially, ensuring the rights of all parties.

Safety: Actions Endangering Others: Possession or use of firearms, knives, or other explosives or lethal articles; tampering with fire extinguishers, fire alarms, or other

devices intended for fire protection; use of material that results in burning, or any other action which endangers the safety of others will not be tolerated.

Open Flame Policy: Among the many priorities for learning, the physical and emotional safety and security of our participants and teachers is our first and highest priority. As a result, any participant who, without permission of an adult, kindles a flame in a school building is liable for expulsion.

Actions Detrimental to Supervisory Role of the Summer Program: Actions which undermine the administrative and supervisory functions of the Summer Programs experience will not be tolerated: such actions include, but are not limited to, absence from campus without permission, unauthorized absence from the dorm after evening check-in or before 6:00 a.m., visiting a member of the opposite sex in a dormitory room, violation of the computer use protocol, riding in vehicles not driven by parents or staff members unless specific permission has been granted, using a vehicle during the academic day without permission, hitchhiking, storing motor vehicles in nearby areas, dishonesty or any failure to take responsibility for one's actions.

HEALTH:

Substance Use Policy

As a community dedicated to personal growth and in keeping with our goals and values, the Summer Program is committed to having a substance-free environment for its participants. Kimball Union works to provide a healthy and wholesome environment and to safeguard the physical and emotional well-being of our participants in order to facilitate learning and personal growth. As a result, participants are expected to be completely drug and alcohol-free while they are enrolled at KUA's Summer Program.

- Possession, supply, consumption or sale of alcohol or any illegal substance or paraphernalia, including tobacco, inhalants and other mood-altering substances is in violation of our program policies and values.
- The misuse of any prescription medications, use of medication not prescribed for the participant, and use of non-prescription drugs for non-medical purposes will be considered a substance violation.
- The use of any ordinary substance for harmful or intoxicant purposes is considered a substance violation.
- Violation of the substance use policy may result in dismissal from the Summer Program and the reporting of the violation to local law enforcement agencies if appropriate

Substance Policy Violations:

The Summer Program places high importance on our responsibility to respond in a clear and consistent manner to any violation of our substance use policy. A participant who is caught or suspected of violating the school's substance use policy may expect the following immediate responses:

- A room, locker, and car search for those with a car on campus
- An escort to the Health Center for possible drug testing
- Directions to call their parents.

OTHER PROGRAM RULES:

Public Display of Affection: The public display of affection is in bad taste, is embarrassing and disrespectful to participants, teachers and visitors to campus. Participants will be held accountable for inappropriate public displays of affection that are embarrassing or discomforting to self or others.

Sexual Intimacy: While we recognize that development of a sexual personality is part of the movement from childhood to adulthood, sexually intimate behavior is not appropriate for participants at the Summer Program. The Summer Program retains the right to take disciplinary action if a participant refuses to honor this policy on sexual intimacy.

Attendance: We feel very strongly that a participant's development and success depend on their timely participation in all required functions. Absences and tardiness affect the experience of the individual participant and his or her peers, as well as hindering opportunities for enrichment.

Dress Code: The Summer Program believes that neatness of dress conveys an attitude of respect towards ourselves and others, and for all community activities during the Summer Program. Clothing should cover mid sections and all private body parts and should be free from excessive rips and stains. Ultimately, clothing should be comfortable and appropriate for the activity.

Co-ed Visitation: Violations of the co-ed visitation rules may result in dismissal from the Summer Programs Experience.

Locked Doors: Participants are required to keep their rooms unlocked when they, or others, are in them. Any participant found behind a locked door may face disciplinary consequences.

Response to Violations:

The Summer Programs Director will react to disciplinary problems as he deems fit in each case. Violations of minor rules will normally be handled by the involved staff member, in consultation with the Summer Programs Director, the program coordinator and/or the Dorm Head. Accumulations of minor rule violations will be handled by the Director of Summer Programs. Violations of the major rules or a series of minor infractions will be considered by administrators.

OFF-CAMPUS PROCEDURES

KUA's Summer Program campus is bounded on the east by Route 120, on the west by Annie Duncan House, on the north by the Flickinger Art Center, and on the south by the Alumni Gymnasium and Carver Field. Travel of any sort beyond the campus including hikes, bicycling or other short trips, must always be recorded and approved. Participants need to travel with at least one other participant. These restrictions are designed for safety and everyone's peace of mind. If we need to find you, the check-out procedures provide the needed information.

This system depends upon trust. No travel may interfere with academic and athletic obligations unless permission has been secured in advance from the Director of Summer Programs.

Departure: Participants may leave campus as indicated on their transportation form. Participants must follow all check-out procedures with their assigned residential counselors and with the Summer Programs Office.

FACILITIES AND SERVICES

The Kimball Union dining hall is run as a cooperative venture. Staff and participants work together to provide a pleasant environment in which the community can gather and eat.

- Lunch served daily from 12:00 to 1:00 pm
- Dinner served daily from 6:00 to 7:00 pm

Saturday meals: As announced; we often go on trips on Saturdays!

Campus Conveniences

KUA Campus Store carries necessities such as deodorant, toothbrushes, and soap as well as snacks and beverages and KUA clothing. Check for store hours.

Mail and Banking Services

The Meriden branch of the United States Post Office is located across the street from the Health Center. It is open Monday through Friday from 9 am to 4:45 pm and Saturday from 9 am to 12 pm

There is an outdoor ATM located downstairs from the post office. It can be accessed by following the driveway between the post office and Mikula Dormitory.

Passports, airline tickets and large sums of cash (anything over \$20) should be deposited in the student bank.. If you have money in the student bank, please see us at the summer programs office to fill out a request for funds at least 24 hours in advance of when you need them.

Laundry Services

Coin operated washers and dryers are available in most dormitories. Laundry detergent will be provided by dorm counselors

Health Services

On-call Nursing

Available 24 hours a day. Please ask counselor if you need to see the nurse.

Emergencies

See a counselor, who will take appropriate action.

Computers

Use of the public access computers on campus and access to the network by personal computers is governed by the Kimball Union Acceptable Use Policy. A signed copy of this document is required before a participant account will be activated. The KUA website will have the latest information about the computer hardware and software needed to connect to the Summer Programs' network

At Kimball Union all residence halls are equipped with Wireless Access Points for accessing the Kimball Union network and the Internet, and there are several public computer areas and several class areas with computers. Participants may bring personal computers to school but are not required to do so. Desktops or laptops, with or without a printer and with or without a wireless card, are acceptable. However, participants without wireless access on their own computers will not have network access from their residence hall.

Participants wishing support for computer-related problems should email support@kua.org.

Acceptable Use Policy and KUA-Net Account Agreement

The Honor Code — the program's policies regarding academic and personal integrity — and community standards, regulations, and guidelines govern the use of technology. Everyone within the KUA's Summer Programs community who uses the school's computing and communications facilities has the responsibility to use them in an ethical, professional, and legal manner. Participants and employees are responsible for becoming familiar with and abiding by the guidelines for appropriate use of the KUA Network (KUA-Net). All participants must sign a copy of this agreement **before** they can utilize any school technologies. This agreement must be signed on an annual basis at the beginning of every school year.

Consequences of Unacceptable Use of the Network

Consequences for participating in unacceptable activities on KUA-Net may include, but are not limited to any of the following: warnings, limitation or suspension of network privileges, school disciplinary action, suspension, or separation. If federal or state laws are broken, the Summer Programs Experience may notify the appropriate authorities.

Cell Phone Usage

Cell phone service is spotty at best in and around our campus. We do not want our participants to make calls or send or receive text messages on cell phones during the class day. We encourage parents to email the participants' advisor for information on each participants' progress.

Mail and Fax Services

Incoming mail, telephone messages, notifications of packages, and miscellaneous school communications are communicated via the Summer Programs Director and his/her designees. Participant addresses should read: Participant name, P.O. Box 188, KUA's Summer Program, Meriden, NH 03770. Questions about the mail will be answered by the Administrative Assistant in the main office. The Meriden Post Office is located across the street from the Health Center.

Participants may also send faxes from the Meriden Country Store at Kimball Union. Outgoing charges are \$2.00 per page domestic, \$5.00 per page international.

Transportation to and from Airports: Kimball Union provides transportation on specified dates to Dartmouth Coach, (Lebanon), Lebanon Airport, Vermont Transit (White River Junction, Vermont), Amtrak (White River Junction, Vermont), Manchester Airport (MHT), and Boston's Logan Airport (BOS). Please be sure to reference the transportation – boarding form (available online) which specifies arrival and departure times. Return the form to the Summer Programs Office. Planning early and involving the program as early as possible will make travel plans easier and help to avoid conflicts with your schedule.

DAY PARTICIPANTS

Schedule: Day participants should arrive between 8:15 and 8:30 daily and expect to depart at 4:15 pm.

Transportation:

Bus: The Summer Program offers bus transportation for Day participants each weekday from Hanover, NH. The bus will pick participants up at the Thompson Ice Rink parking

lot at 7:45 am and the Lebanon Co-Op parking lot at 7:55 am. The bus will drop-off at Lebanon Co-Op at 4:45 pm and the Thompson Rink parking lot at 5 pm. There will be a nominal charge for use of the bus, which agreement is available from the Summer Programs Office.

Cars: Day participants with licenses may use their cars to come to and return from the program. They may not drive around campus during the day, however, and they may not use the car to leave campus during the day without permission. It is the responsibility of the driving day participant to ensure that any other day participant who rides with him or her has parental permission to do so. Day participants may not transport boarding participants on or off campus without approval from an administrator.

All day participant parking is at the far side of the Flickinger Arts Center parking lot, next to the tennis courts.

Day students must check in at the entrance to the Student Center when they arrive on campus each day and when they depart in the afternoon.

Evenings: Programming after 4:30 is usually available to boarding participants only. Our staffing levels, equipment, and food are scheduled based on boarding enrollment. If your child is interested in attending boarding activities, you may make a special request to the Director of Summer Programs. Additional fees may apply if he/she decides that participation is feasible.
